DEAR FRIENDS...

A channel of peace? Have you ever cried out for peace? I don't mean peace in a global sense, but that time of stillness and silence that we all need in our daily life. Those of us who are parents probably cried out this way on a regular basis. But

did our parents need to demand peace from us? Peace is one of those intangible gifts that Jesus promised to his disciples. He said that he would leave his peace, '... such as the world cannot give.' It is a quote often heard at funerals, but its application is wider. One of the gospel readings for September, though, speaks not of peace but of forgiveness. It tells of the slave who is forgiven by his master for having accumulated much debt; what was owed was cancelled. Yet the same slave goes out to one who owes him a little and treats him with cruelty rather than mercy. The master, on finding out, chastises the first slave and throws him in prison. So, what has forgiveness to do with peace?

There are times when we need to learn forgiveness before we may know peace. A few days before I wrote this, I heard on the radio a brief article on 'The Troubles' in Northern Ireland. It spoke of the work done to uncover the truth of all that happened during those years. The journalist told of those who wanted to hide what was done, wanting to keep their past and their guilt hidden. Also spoken of were the people who simply wanted answers; they wanted to know the truth about their loved ones. They wanted to know so that they could complete the story and be healed. Some, a

minority, also offered forgiveness to those who had robbed them of their loved ones. What struck me was that it was those who offered genuine forgiveness that seemed to convey the greatest sense of peace. It was a peace that transcended a lack of noise or violence. It was a peace that seemed to offer strength to carry on and live. It was a peace such as the world could not give.

The well-known song, based upon the words of a prayer attributed to St. Francis of Assisi, calls us to seek to be channels of peace. It asks us to be those who seek to understand rather than be understood. Such is a truly difficult task to fulfil. We would rather be heard, and we would rather have our own way, grudges and vengeance included. It's part of being human. But can we, instead, lean on Jesus and be bearers of that peace which can only come from him?





WINTER PROJECT: WOOLLY BLANKETS

Reid Memorial's Knit and Natter group has taken on a challenge to knit/crochet squares, to be made into blankets which will be donated to the Red Cross and the Salvation Army, preferably for local use. We envisage the squares as 6" (15cms) square - plain, striped, cabled, patterned - whatever you like - and we are inviting members of the Reid to contribute if they wish. I'm not going to recommend any particular pattern, for we all knit/crochet to different tensions, but a 6" square in DK or equivalent is a very useful size. You responded very generously to my previous appeal for yarn (typically Reid!) so, for this project I can offer to put a box of yarn at the back of the church for anyone to who wants to knit and has already cleared out all those odd balls!

We've not put a number on how many squares we want - we'll work with what comes in, but, with winter coming on, please help!

Historic Environment Scotland contacted the minister early in July to ask for permission to photograph the Reid's stained-glass windows because 'they are concerned that the Reid Memorial will be one of the ones to be closed under the current Presbytery Mission Plan'.

Permission was readily given, and I met Mr Simon Green and a photographer on July 5th (Mr Green is the manager of the Buildings at Risk Survey Project, and an architectural historian, with an interest in the Arts and Crafts movement.) > > I showed him over the original parts of the Reid (the church itself, the cloister area, the small hall, and the turret room.) It was pleasant to hear his professional appreciation of aspects of the Reid, and he was also delighted to find a large, framed picture of various aspects/elevations of the Reid in the Turret Room.

All of Reid Memorial's stained-glass windows were photographed internally that day, and photographed externally the following day. HES, at this stage, is interested only in the founding and opening of the Reid Memorial.

With the Board's consent, I will offer HES a copy of what is (I think) the original descriptive pamphlet, a copy of the leaflet describing the stained-glass windows and the carvings, and a copy of the photograph of the Ministers who attended the dedication of the Reid Memorial (18 in all!) but I shall point out the inaccuracy of the dating in the caption. I will pass on any information /response I get from HES.

Completed in 1966, like the Reid it is one of the most beautiful in Edinburgh.






MURIEL PEARSON is the current Church of Scotland Mission

CHRISTIAN AID SAYS 'MAKE THE POLLUTERS PAY'...

On Wednesday 21st Sept, I attended a Christian Aid Scotland drop-in event where local representatives, organisers and supporters met and enjoyed an online meeting with Christian Aid's UK Executive Officer, Patrick Watt. The timing of this was particularly apposite, coming the day after

the Prime Minister signalled his government's reversal of several Climate Emergency-related policies - a move of concern both to the charity and many who care about the planet's future. On that note, Christian Aid has just launched its #makepolluterspay campaign, saying, 'The climate crisis is causing devastation to people's lives. Meanwhile polluters continue to profit while communities pay the price.' It's calling on supporters to ask their MPs and MSPs to support it by writing to them or tagging them in social media

posts, (which is how come they photographed me). More information and template letters are available here. PRESBYTERY REPORT...

I thought that it would be of interest to the congregation to know what goes on at Presbytery meetings. I've highlighted some items that were discussed and agreed this year, that's not to say that the subjects that I've chosen to leave out are of less importance. If you'd like more details on any of the items below, please get in touch with me. The Presbytery meetings are open to all, so information can be shared.

Since the Presbytery Mission Plan (PMP) was agreed in April 2023, eight ministers have demitted their charge: five are in Edinburgh and 3 in West Lothian. Some have retired, others are taking up posts elsewhere and one has left the ministry.

Five unions have been agreed by Edinburgh and West Lothian Presbytery (EWLP). All of the unions had two churches involved, all were vacant charges, and each union has been granted permission to call a minister. Three of the unions are in Edinburgh and two in West Lothian.

A report was presented by Rev Stewart Weaver, Convenor of the Deployment Group, that offered clarification on some issues around the implementation of the PMP.

- Local Guidance: notes on guidance for unions have been supplied by the national church.
- Review of Reviewable Charges: there are 13 Reviewable Charges in the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian. As the process of PMP implementation unfolds, reviews of these charges will be undertaken in order to ensure that the Presbytery Mission Plan is fully implemented.
- Adjustments and Congregations: documents for every union >

- > need to be drawn up, discussed, and agreed. This process requires input from Kirk Sessions, congregations, steering groups, Deployment, and bodies in the national church. This process requires a significant amount of time and effort.
- Amendments to the Plan: at the annual development and evaluation review, the national bodies will look at the approved Presbytery Mission Plan in order to assess the progress of implementation and any necessary recalibrations. There may be opportunity for adjustments. This necessitates the full process of discussion and approval. It will therefore not be done lightly.

At the meeting on 12th September 2023, Rev Ken Brown spoke of his role as Mission Co-ordinator for EWLP. He is keen to engage with congregations to develop mission ideas and share best practice.

We were informed that there had been an increase in the number of permissions sought for the sale of manses. Many do not meet standards for energy efficiency, and water and wind-tight criteria. In some cases, it is considered simpler and cheaper to sell the old manses and buy new. Some are no longer required due to unions.

FIRE EVACUATION PROCEDURE

- Fire marshall tabards are available for door duty people
- The organist will summon the emergency services
- Evacuate the building using the closest exit to you
- Assemble at 119 West Savile Terrace at the opposite side of the road to the church
- The people on door duty will be available to assist
- Four exits from the Main Sanctuary, two at the north side and two at the south side
- There are several other exits in the corridors and halls, and you should make yourself aware of them
- Fire extinguishers throughout the buildings are mainly situated close to the exits.
